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Merola Artists Emergency Fund

Providing Much-Needed Assistance to Merola Alums During the COVID-19 Pandemic

In April, Merola launched the Merola Artists Emergency Fund to help alumni who have suffered financial hardships brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic. Available to Merola participants from the past five years (2015-2019), the fund is intended to assist these young opera singers, coach accompanists, conductors, and directors who are in the early stages of establishing their careers and have suffered significant financial losses due to canceled performance contracts. Merola felt that it was imperative to step up and offer financial assistance and support for our alumni who are in the critical early stages of establishing their careers. To date, more than \$138,000 has been distributed to Merola alumni through the fund.

Board President Barbara Bruser Clark and Board Chairman Patrick Wilken said, "So many of our talented Merola participants have suddenly seen engagements evaporate. They are in such a crucial period of launching their careers in opera houses around the world, and it is our goal to help them remain on course and fulfill their immense potential."

Merola already provides continuing support to its alumni for career development, making Merola Career Grants available for five years following an artist's participation in the program to support everything from audition travel to headshots to vocal coaching, helping the young artists ease their transition to the professional opera world. In response to the Merola Board's decision to support this initiative, Merola Artistic Director and San Francisco Opera Center Director Sheri Greenawald said, "This will be an extraordinarily valuable resource for Merolini struggling under the weight of many cancellations. It is an amazing, altruistic act by our board and the many supporters who are stepping up to contribute. On behalf of artists everywhere, we thank you from the bottom of our hearts."

Several artists, who have lost contracts and scheduled appearances to sing at concert halls from The Met to Chateau de Versailles, responded with words of praise, including soprano Toni Marie Palmertree (Merola '15) who replied, "I cannot help but write back immediately to express my gratitude. To everyone involved, thank you for thinking of us and supporting us in at a time that Merola will also feel some loss." Countertenor Aryeh Nussbaum Cohen (Merola '16) added, "The fund will make such a huge difference in my life, and in the lives of all recent Merolini." Soprano Mary Evelyn Hangley (Merola '16) noted, "Since completing the program, Merola has been the most supportive organization at every turn of my career."

Dear friends,

For the first time in more than six decades, we will be starting the summer without welcoming 29 young artists to San Francisco. Although it is heartbreaking not to have the usual Merola summer, we are excited about the virtual enrichment we have

planned throughout the month of July, which will prepare the young artists for our full program in 2021. All of of the artists who had been chosen for our 2020 program have been invited back in 2021.

The young artists will have four weeks of in-depth acting and language classes, as well as mentoring with Alan Darling, Martin Katz, and Kevin Murphy. We hope you will join us for a virtual Meet the Young Artists and four "master chats" during which industry leaders will share their insights with the young artists. These chats will feature Susan Graham, renowned mezzo-soprano and Merola alumna; Francesca Zambello, Director of Glimmerglass and Washington National Opera; David Garrison, Tony-nominated actor and director who will direct *Postcard from Morocco* in 2021; and Eun Sun Kim, Caroline H. Hume Music Director Designate of San Francisco Opera, and Gregory Henkel, SFO's Managing Director: Artistic.

Next fall, we will have a virtual version of our canceled off-season event that was to have occurred this past March. Sheri Greenawald, Mark Morash, and Kip Cranna will offer their insights into *Postcard from Morocco* and *Le nozze di Figaro*, which we will now present in 2021.

The virtual events this summer and fall will give all of us a chance to connect with the young artists in anticipation of meeting them in person in 2021. The artists will get to know each other and some of the faculty during this virtual learning and will already have begun to bond before they arrive in San Francisco next summer. Challenging as this time is, we know Merola and our young artists will emerge even stronger when our full program can resume.

I look forward to seeing you virtually—and in person when the Merola family can safely gather together again.

In Memoriam: Rockford Douglas Norby



Longtime Merola supporter Rockford Douglas ("Doug") Norby died unexpectedly of natural causes at his Sonoma home on April 13, 2020. Doug was born on June 28, 1935, in Silver City, New Mexico, grew up in Grass Valley, CA, and lived most of his life in San Francisco, Marin County, and the Bay Area. After graduating from

Harvard with high honors, he went on to earn his MBA as a Harvard Business School Baker Scholar. Doug's ingenuity and creativity in business led to a long and diverse career, in New York (McKinsey & Co.) and in the Bay Area, where he had leadership roles at Fairchild, LSI Logic, Syntex, Lucasfilm Ltd., Tessera, and more.

After retirement, he brought his expertise to the boards of international technology and pharmaceutical companies in Singapore, Tokyo, and Seoul, as well as domestic companies Alexion and Krystal Biotech. In addition to his many business activities, Doug was an enthusiastic lifelong learner in such varied areas as archeology, art, music, medicine and health, cosmology, and quantum physics. He took pleasure in outdoor activities with his friends and family, creating cherished memories of their adventures together.

Doug is survived by Susan, his spouse of more than 30 years; three wonderful children; and five grandchildren. Everyone who knew him will remember his dapper style, sense of humor, intelligence, curiosity, kindness, thoughtfulness, philanthropy, and above all, despite his many accomplishments, his humility. He was an accomplished partner and a citizen of the world, and will be deeply missed.
